- Melissa Moschella, Assistant Professor of Philosophy at Catholic University of America and Myser Fellow at the Notre Dame Center for Ethics and Culture

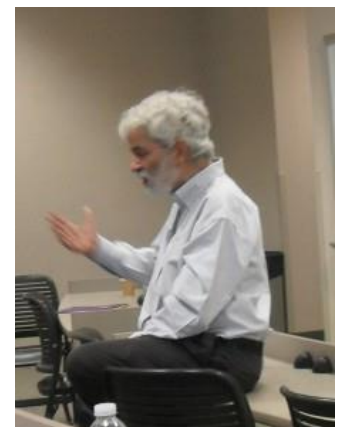

The pressure to "legalize abortion in a broad range of cases has no basis" in UN treaties or any other legally binding



convention to which Ecuador belongs, she said.

It is perhaps somewhat simplistic, as any such effort would be, but it does give one a path to follow in thinking about confusing situations. For those that aren’t Catholic, you can start at “Will your action contribute to the principle agent’s act?”

## Editor's Corner

At the beginning of this summer the world's attention seemed to have moved away from life issues to the question of marriage and of ISIS. Many pro-life scholars, while continuing their pro-life work, also turned their attention and energy to the Supreme Court's *Obergefell* ruling. Politicians seem to want to soften their pro-life credentials so they can focus on “important” issues. Maybe I was just becoming complacent and distracted myself.

Then the videos of Planned Parenthood began to be released. Suddenly the grizzly reality of abortion and the cold, methodical disregard for the sanctity of life that seems to dominate top-level employees of Planned Parenthood were shown is stark relief.

The magnitude of the evil exposed by these videos—a window into the actual horrific act of abortion itself—leads me to three conclusions.

First, the work of UFL continues to be vitally important. The intellectual front is among the most important fronts on which to fight against what St. John Paul II labeled the Culture of Death.

Second, as Richard Stith points out in his *First Things* article, “[Facing the Unborn](#),” pro-life advocates also need to appeal to the imagination as well as arguments from reason. That is why literature and history is as important as philosophy and law.

Finally, it becomes clearer to me that the battle we are fighting is not just a matter of arguments or imagination or law or any human reality.

There has to be more going on here than moral blindness and intellectual obfuscation. From my perspective (of faith) there is a supernatural center to the depths of the rejection of human dignity by Planned Parenthood and their allies. I hope those of us who are persons of faith will use whatever spiritual resources we have in our traditions to fight this kind of evil.
