Rev. John J. Conley, S.J., is Professor of Philosophy at Fordham University. A specialist in ethics, aesthetics, and early modern philosophy, he recently published *The Suspicion of Virtue: Women Philosophers in Neoclassical France* (Cornell University Press, 2002), *Jacqueline Pascal: A Rule for Children* (University of Chicago Press, 2003), and *Madame de Maintenon: Dialogues and Addresses* (University of Chicago Press, 2004).

Jean Echlin is a registered nurse with a master's degree in nursing science from Wayne State University's College of Nursing (Detroit MI). Her experience includes nursing practice, education, administration, consultation, and publication. She was instrumental in the development of the clinical and volunteer programs of Canada's largest hospice (Windsor, Ontario). She developed the Palliative Care Consultation Team at University Hospital, a large tertiary care setting in London, Ontario. In April 2005 she received the prestigious "Dorothy Ley Award of Excellence" from the Ontario Palliative Care Association.

Robert L. Fastiggi was born in New Jersey in 1953. He earned an A.B. in Religion from Dartmouth College (1974) and then an M.A. (1976) and Ph.D. (1987) in Theology from Fordham University. From 1985 to 1999 he taught in the Department of Religious Studies of St. Edward's University (Austin, Texas). Since 1999 he has been Associate Professor of Systematic Theology at Sacred Heart Major Seminary (Detroit, Michigan). He has also been an Adjunct Professor of the Institute for Pastoral Theology of Ave Maria University. Professor Fastiggi is the author of one book and over sixty articles and book reviews. He and his wife, Kathleen, live in Dearborn Heights, Michigan, with their three children.

Damian P. Fedoryka obtained his graduate degrees from Fordham University and the University of Salzburg after receiving an undergraduate education at the University of Louvain. Currently a Professor of Philosophy at Ave Maria College in Ypsilanti Michigan, he has previously served as President of Christendom College and has taught at several universities, including Franciscan University of Steubenville. He has also done extensive lecturing and teaching in post-Communist

Richard J. Fehring, D.N.Sc., R.N., is a Professor of Nursing and Director of the Marquette University Institute for Natural Family Planning. He received his masters and doctorate in nursing science from the Catholic University of America and a baccalaureate in biology and nursing from Marquette University. He has published over eighty articles and book chapters in such journals as *Fertility and Sterility*, *Contraception*, *Journal of Midwifery and Women's Health*, and *The Journal of Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Neonatal Nursing*. Professor Fehring is the current writer and editor of *Current Medical Research in Natural Family Planning*, a publication of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. He is a board member of University Faculty for Life and the President of the Marquette University Chapter.

Joel S. Fetzer is Associate Professor of Political Science at Pepperdine University, and he has previously taught or conducted research at Central Michigan University, the University of Southern California, and the University of Osnabrück (Germany). Prof. Fetzer earned his A.B. from Cornell University and his Ph.D. in Political Science from Yale University. He has worked in civil rights enforcement at the U.S. Department of Labor. His research and teaching interests include migration studies, religion and politics, and politics and society in the U.S., France, Germany, and Taiwan. He has presented invited lectures at Depauw University, the University of Southern California, Harvard University, and the University of California at Berkeley. His most recent book (with J. Christopher Soper) is *Muslims and the State in Britain, France, and Germany* (Cambridge University Press, 2005).

Clarke D. Forsythe, Esq., is Director of the Project in Law & Bioethics with Americans United for Life. He has argued cases before federal and state appellate courts and has testified before Congress and state legislatures. He has published a dozen professional legal articles on constitutional and bioethical issues, and has also published numerous essays in magazines and newspapers, including *The Wall Street Journal*.

Anne Barbeau Gardiner is Professor Emerita in the Department of English at John Jay College, City University of New York. She has published two books on the Catholic poet and dramatist John Dryden: *The Intellectual Design of John Dryden's Heroic Plays* (Yale University Press, 1970) and *Ancient Faith and Modern Freedom in John Dryden's The Hind and the Panther* (Catholic University of America Press, 1998). She has also published a number of essays on Milton, Pope, Swift, and Catholics of the late seventeenth century. At present she is writing a book on "English Catholics and the Great Struggle for Liberty of Conscience, 1660-1700."

Jane H. Gilroy is Associate Professor of English at Molloy College in Rockville Centre, New York. She earned her doctorate at Fordham University. She has published articles, both scholarly and of general interest, on the subject of her dissertation, the early English translations of St. Bridget of Sweden's *Revelations*. Prof. Gilroy has also submitted two articles, one on "St. Bridget of Sweden" and the other on "University Faculty for Life" for *Catholic Social Thought, Social Science, and Social Policy: An Encyclopedia*, scheduled for publication in 2006. She is the President of the Long Island Chapter of University Faculty for Life. She is the Co-Chair for Membership and a Board Member of UFL.

John Keown, M.A., D.Phil., Ph.D., is the Rose F. Kennedy Professor of Christian Ethics at the Kennedy Institute of Ethics of Georgetown University. He studied law at the University of Cambridge before taking his doctorate at the University of Oxford. After being called to the Bar of England and Wales, he taught medical law and ethics at the University of Leicester. In 1993 he was appointed to a new post in medical law and ethics established in the faculty of law at Cambridge. He was also elected to Fellowships at Queens' College and at Churchill College. His publications, which have been cited by such bodies as the U.S. Supreme Court and the House of Lords, include *Abortion, Doctors and the Law* (1988), *Euthanasia Examined* (1995) and *Euthanasia, Ethics and Public Policy* (2002), all from Cambridge University Press.

Rev. Thomas M. King, S.J. is a founder of UFL and served for fourteen years as its President. He has been teaching theology at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. since 1968. He has specialized in the writings of Pierre Teilhard de Chardin and has published nine academic

Holistic Sexuality is a program for college students offered either as a credit course or as an elective. She is a member of several professional and learned societies, and resides in Bethesda, MD.

Jeff Koloze holds his Ph.D. in English and has presented numerous papers on his primary research interest: how the right-to-life issues of abortion, infanticide, and euthanasia are treated in American fiction. Many of these papers have been published in conference proceedings and on the web. His first book (on abortion in twentieth-century American fiction) is forthcoming. Currently, Dr. Koloze facilitates communications, English, and humanities courses for the University of Phoenix through its Cincinnati and Columbus campuses. Previously, he had been adjunct and full-time faculty for sixteen years at several colleges and universities in Cleveland, Ohio and in Springfield, Ohio, teaching undergraduate business writing, grammar, rhetoric, research, and graduate and undergraduate literature courses. He is the Book Review Editor for the Catholic medical ethics journal *The Linacre Quarterly*.
